Reading: 1 John 3:1-7

Everyone who commits sin is guilty of lawlessness; sin is lawlessness. You know that he was revealed to take away sins, and in him there is no sin. No one who abides in him sins; no one who sins has either seen him or known him. Little children, let no one deceive you. Everyone who does what is right is righteous, just as he is righteous.

Reflection

The letter is a call to work out in daily life the implications of what we claim to believe. John exhorts his readers to make sure that the way they live is a parallel with what has been achieved for them through Jesus.

The author tells fellow Christians that they are children of God! That's who we really are. But that's also why the world doesn't recognise us or take us seriously, because it has no idea who he is or what he's up to. But friends that's exactly who we are, children of God. And that's only the beginning. Who knows how we will end up! What we know is that when Christ is openly revealed, we'll see him and in seeing him, become like him. Until then we must strive to be pure, just as God is pure.

The two most difficult things to get straight in life are love and God. More often than not, the mess people make of their lives can be traced to failure or stupidity or meanness in one or both of these areas. The basic and biblical Christian conviction is that the two subjects are intricately related. If we want to deal with God the right way, we have to learn to love the right way. If we want to love the right way, we have to deal with God the right way. God and love can't be separated. John's three letters provide wonderfully explicit direction in how this works. In Jesus, God and love are linked accurately, intricately and indissolubly. The letter is a call to work out in daily life the implications of what we claim to believe.

While recently working the till in a charity shop where I volunteer at with a colleague, a man said to us, 'Do you go to Church?' I replied, 'Yes, I do' and he dismissed me and said, 'I know you do. I can see Jesus in you. What about you?' he said to my colleague. She replied, 'No' and he told her she needs to go; then paid for his goods and went. We were both in shock. It is not often someone tells me they see Jesus in me. This opened up a conversation with the colleague that I would never have had. A demonstration of loving the right way can lead to all sorts of conversations. Perhaps you could think of a time you had a similar conversation.

1 John is never an easy text to read. It makes use of symbolism and contrast to paint a picture of the world in which those who belong to John's community are quite sharply distinguished from outsiders. Verse 6 is particularly difficult, "nobody who abides in him sins". The only possible meaning of this verse is that those who sin – which everyone does! continues to abide in Jesus. There appears to be a voluntary or even an involuntary, serving in this case.

The easiest way to deal with 1 John is to look for the ultimate sense of hopefulness and not become bogged down in symbolic detail. In this case the future hope is not difficult to spot. "What we do know is this when he is revealed, we will be like him, for we will see him as he is". The doctrine of the resurrection has no significant meaning unless it has significant meaning to us.

Try this short prayer along with the actions, perhaps do it a couple of times to feel the effect:

See Christ in all things. (*shade eyes as though looking into the distance*) Hear Christ through all things. (*cup hands around ears*) Know Christ during all things. (*look around*) Feel Christ amidst all things. (*touch each hand with the other*) Understand Christ from all things. (*put fingers to each temple*) **Amen**
