Reflection

For many years I have held true to a personal motto – *I'd rather take a risk, than miss an opportunity!* This motto or personal philosophy was the outcome following a period of reflection at a conference that I attended in the Crystal Cathedral in Los Angeles. The story behind the building of this magnificent glass structure is a testament to the power of positive thinking. Revd. Dr Robert Schuller, the founder of the Cathedral was a minister of the Dutch Reform Church, who had the vision to build a 2500-seater Church in Orange Grove. The money was to be raised by donations. The original cost was estimated to be in the region \$9 million. Robert Schuller tells the story that he was asking a particular donor if they would donate \$1million to the project, the donor said he needed some time to think about making such a large donation. After leaving the donor's office Schuller discovered that the original estimated cost was way off the actual cost, thought now to be in the region of \$18 million, and so he returned to tell the donor that the Cathedral was not likely to be built as he could not envisage raising the extra millions of dollars now needed, and so he was

going to abandoned the project. The donor's response was to say that he would give the first million dollars, and challenged Schuller by asking, "would a million dollars dig a hole big enough for the foundations, whilst you raised the rest of the money required?" Three years later the Cathedral was dedicated.

I think that Ananias must have been that sort of person who was on the lookout, or more accurately was open to possibilities the God would send his way. This familiar story following on from the conversion of Paul, could have a very different outcome for the life of Paul, and subsequentially the life of the Church if Ananias had acted differently. What if Ananias had decided that the reputation of Paul, or as he was still known Saul was such that he could not be trusted? What if Saul was using an experience as a scam or form of entrapment? What if Ananias was more concerned with the safety of the newly formed band of believers rather than be concerned about the life of a relatively unknown person?

The foundational truth of this story is that Ananias trusted Jesus more than he distrusted Saul. The vision, the dream, the listening ear of prayer, meant that he was willing to make the most of a moment, rather than live with the regret of what might have been, and consequently we can say that literally the whole face of Christendom was changed. Ananias had his doubts and concerns, that is evident, but he was willing to be available and respond to a moment, to take a risk and for me the most powerful action is in the act of greeting Saul as a brother, no timidity, no apprehensiveness but to reach out touch him and call him brother.

How often the small inconsequential acts can be the turning point in another's life. By how we conduct ourselves, what we do or do not do. I recently met with a lady who having been a church attender for all her life, moved house some 10 years ago, and seeking a new place of worship attended her local church for the first time. She told me she sat amongst a group of "hat wearing "women, (not that there is anything wrong with hat wearing!) But that they spoke freely amongst themselves, but not to the new stranger in their midst. Needless to say, she has not been back to that Church since.

Often it is not the great and glorious, the grand gestures that make the biggest difference, but the small almost imperceptible gesture, act or word that could transform the life of another.

Where is God's moment for you to touch the life of another by a touch or the equivalent phrase of Brother or sister! I commend to you my motto – I would rather take a risk than miss an opportunity - for Jesus.

Prayers

Gracious God, who gave your Son that we might be free, and your Holy Spirit that we might be bold, forgive us when we have been so concerned with our own position, or intimidated by the story of others that we have failed to make the most of opportunities presented to us to share the good news of your love and grace in our lives.

In the stillness and quietness of our prayer life, so attune ourselves to what you are saying, that we block out the noise and clamour of our own anxieties, and so learn to trust you, rather than mistrust ourselves to the views and opinions of others.

May we live our lives that others see in us the rhythm of a life marked by your presence, and may we be ever mindful of every opportunity, and moment to offer love, forgiveness and hope to those around us. Amen
