Matthew: 1 - 12 The Beatitudes

When Jesus saw the crowds He went up the mountain; and after he sat down, his disciples came to him. Then He began to speak and taught them, saying:
"Blessed are the poor in spirit, for theirs is the kingdom of heaven.
Blessed are those who mourn, for they will be comforted.
Blessed are the meek, for they will inherit the earth.
Blessed are those who hunger and thirst for righteousness, for they will be filled.
Blessed are the merciful, for they will receive mercy
Blessed are the pure in heart, for they will see God.
Blessed are the peacemakers, for they will be called children of God.
Blessed are those who are persecuted for righteousness' sake, for theirs is the kingdom of heaven.
Blessed are you when people revile you and persecute you and utter all kinds of evil against you falsely on my account.
Rejoice and be glad, for your reward is great in heaven, for in the same way they persecuted the prophets who were before you."

Reflection on The Beatitudes

Jesus makes a fairly straightforward list for us in our reading, telling us what we need to do to please God. And we hear, that not only will God be pleased if we are like this, but we will also be blessed. It sounds as though God's delight will rub off onto us, and when God smiles with pleasure, his smile radiates blessings upon the source of His joy. Isn't that a fantastic point to consider! Something that you or I might do, giving God pleasure and resulting in us being blest. Fantastic! So, where's the catch?

Well of course there isn't one. Jesus is not a tricky Saviour to obey, but He is clear. These blessings come when we are Christlike, and have the same attitudes that He has.

Although Jesus most definitely put a new spin and interpretation, upon much of the Jewish law and customs observed in His day, He was often restating what the prophets before him had said. In Micah 6:8 we hear some of the most well-known words from the Old Testament, **“He has told you, O mortal, what is good; and what does the Lord require of you but to do justice, and to love kindness, and to walk humbly with your God.”** It’s quite interesting to match up the various Beatitudes with this prophecy. And each one nestles beautifully within its words. We just have to unpick them a little, and understand what it was that Jesus was saying to His disciples, and is saying to us now.

Humility, kindness, sorrow, meekness, personal sacrifice, courage, mercy. Godly qualities that are not very popular in our go getter society. In fact, they never have been. Kindness might masquerade in popular media, when applied to worthy or good causes, but Jesus’ teachings included all people and things that need our care.

Our care as demonstrated by Jesus on the cross, should include everybody, and everything. “He died to save us all” as the hymn says. Justice is something else the Old Testament Prophets were very keen on, something which also seems to be in short supply in our world. Isaiah 1:17 says this, **“learn to do good, seek justice, rescue the oppressed, defend the orphan, plead for the widow.”** There are many, many, such verses concerning the right treatment of our fellow men and women. Putting it simply, if someone matters to God, then they should matter to us, and all mankind matters to God.

We may read or hear about someone, and find ourselves critical of their behaviour or things they say. We are never asked to condone evil, but we are asked to show mercy and compassion to all. Our prayers may well begin with us opening our hearts to God in anger or distress at what someone has said or done, but should end in our praying for them.

I believe the best way of thinking about challenging situations and people, is to remember before we make any judgements or form opinions about them, that all mankind is made in the image of God, and that God loves them. As He loves you and I.

And even those far away, by their own decision, from following Jesus, receive daily blessings from God. Jesus tells us that we should, **“love our enemies and pray for those who persecute us”** because our Father, **“makes His sun, rise on the evil and the good, and sends rain on the righteous and the unrighteous.”** Matthew 5:44-45

There’s so much to say about each individual quality and blessing listed in The Beatitudes, but today let’s think of them as a whole. As a description not only of Jesus, as they most certainly are, but as something for us all to aspire to in fuller and greater ways. Amen
