Reading Hebrews 12: 18 - 29

You have not come to a mountain that can be touched and that is burning with fire; to darkness, gloom and storm; to a trumpet blast or to such a voice speaking words that those who heard it begged that no further word be spoken to them, because they could not bear what was commanded: "If even an animal touches the mountain, it must be stoned to death." The sight was so terrifying that Moses said, "I am trembling with fear."

But you have come to Mount Zion, to the city of the living God, the heavenly Jerusalem. You have come to thousands upon thousands of angels in joyful assembly, to the church of the firstborn, whose names are written in heaven. You have come to God, the Judge of all, to the spirits of the righteous made perfect, to Jesus the mediator of a new covenant, and to the sprinkled blood that speaks a better word than the blood of Abel.

See to it that you do not refuse him who speaks. If they did not escape when they refused him who warned them on earth, how much less will we, if we turn away from him who warns us from heaven? At that time his voice shook the earth, but now he has promised, "Once more I will shake not only the earth but also the heavens." The words "once more" indicate the removing of what can be shaken - that is, created things - so that what cannot be shaken may remain.

Therefore, since we are receiving a kingdom that cannot be shaken, let us be thankful, and so worship God acceptably with reverence and awe, for our "God is a consuming fire."

Reflection

I have spent time in recent days trying to understand what it means to live in a multicultural society. Often the debate it seems to me is prompted not so much about our ability to live by grace and through acceptance of one another, but with a fear of somehow losing control over something that we proclaim is precious to us, but when push comes to shove, is difficult to describe. Is my culture shaped by my surroundings, or do I shape my culture by my values, and if I do then where do those values come from, and are my values better than the values, or traditions of others?

When Paul writes to the Hebrew church, a community of believers shaped and molded by heritage, tradition, and religious background, he states emphatically that - "since we are receiving a kingdom that cannot be shaken, let us be thankful, and so worship God acceptably with reverence and awe, for our "God is a consuming fire." (Hebrews 12; 28,29) or as The Message translation puts it, "Do you see what we've got? An unshakable kingdom! And do you see how thankful we must be? Not only thankful, but brimming with worship, deeply reverent before God. For God is not an indifferent bystander. He's actively cleaning house, torching all that needs to burn, and he won't quit until it's all cleansed."

So, what is this Kingdom that God says we live in and by? This Kingdom involves a choice where we take the initiative to live for God and His kingdom, or as Jesus taught in His prayer, "Thy kingdom come. Thy will be done in earth, as it is in heaven." (Matthew 6:10 KJV)

Many years earlier than this, the writer of the Psalms wrote, "Teach us to number our days aright, that we may gain a heart of wisdom." (Psalm 90:12 NIV) So much of our lives seem to be lived out through what I would call an automatic gear mode. Just as in a car, the engine decides what is the best gear to drive up a hill matching gradient with speed, it self-selects the most efficient gear to use in order not to strain the engine. For many of us we seemingly do the same with life choices, we allow or enable others to decide, often based upon making the least fuss or to enable us to blend into the background around us, we fit our culture, rather than shape a Kingdom. Life for many remains in automatic mode, until something goes wrong. However, Psalm 90:12 says whilst God has control of my life - I am intentionally going to manually set my days - life will not just happen, but I have an intentional attitude to choose the values and truths that will emanate from my life.

The familiar prayer, "Thy Kingdom come, Thy will be done", tells us of both a desire for the now and the future. That same prayer also tells us of the blessing of living in that Kingdom - "For thine is the Kingdom and the power and the glory" - this is as Paul reminds us a Kingdom that is unshakeable, if only we learn to live in it and by it, or as the writer of old reminds us in Psalm 91: "Whoever dwells in the shelter of the Most High will rest in the shadow of the Almighty. I will say of the Lord, "He is my refuge and my fortress, my God, in whom I trust."

If you say, "The Lord is my refuge, and you make the Most High your dwelling, no harm will overtake you; no disaster will come near your tent.

Because he loves me," says the Lord, "I will rescue him; I will protect him, for he acknowledges my name. He will call on me, and I will answer him; I will be with him in trouble."

Here is the familiar prayer of surrender, but the full version not the edited version so often used:

"God, grant me the serenity to accept the thing I cannot change, the courage to change the things I can, and the wisdom to know the difference. Living one day at a time; Enjoying one moment at a time; Accepting hardship as a pathway to peace; Taking as Jesus did, this sinful world as it is, not as I would have it; Trusting that You will make all things right if I surrender to Your will so that I may be reasonably happy in this life and supremely happy with You forever in the next. Amen."
