Reading: Matthew 2 v 1 – 12

In the time of King Herod, after Jesus was born in Bethlehem of Judea, wise men from the East came to Jerusalem, asking, 'Where is the child who has been born king of the Jews? For we observed his star at its rising and have come to pay him homage.' When King Herod heard this, he was frightened, and all Jerusalem with him; and calling together all the chief priests and scribes of the people, he inquired of them where the Messiah was to be born. They told him, 'In Bethlehem of Judea; for so it has been written by the prophet:

"And you, Bethlehem, in the land of Judah, are by no means least among the rulers of Judah; for from you shall come a ruler who is to shepherd my people Israel."

Then Herod secretly called for the wise men and learned from them the exact time when the star had appeared. Then he sent them to Bethlehem, saying, 'Go and search diligently for the child; and when you have found him, bring me word so that I may also go and pay him homage.' When they had heard the king, they set out; and there, ahead of them, went the star that they had seen at its rising, until it stopped over the place where the child was. When they saw that the star had stopped, they were overwhelmed with joy. On entering the house, they saw the child with Mary his mother; and they knelt down and paid him homage. Then, opening their treasure-chests, they offered him gifts of gold, frankincense, and myrrh. And having been warned in a dream not to return to Herod, they left for their own country by another road.

Reflection:

I love the feast of Epiphany. The word means "Reveal", and it marks the visit of the Magi who had followed the star to Bethlehem to find Jesus. It's a story that encompasses high drama, politics and supernatural intervention. And right at the centre of it all, there is a little child with bemused parents.

Nowadays it seems the season of Christmas starts earlier and earlier; I saw decorations for sale before the end of August! No wonder there are people who take them down on Boxing Day thinking, "That's it, Christmas is over for another year." Yet, the Christian calendar has developed to give us time to ponder as Mary did. The promised Saviour has been born, and he is receiving visitors. The wise men, contrary to most Nativity plays, did not meet the shepherds - they came along much later, even up to two years. We don't know how many there were, there were three gifts, but it is tradition, not scripture, which has decided there were three called Caspar, Melchior and Balthazar.

What we can be sure of is that they travelled a long way and it would have taken time, resources and determination. They spotted the star, interpreted its meaning and then used their own logic to head to Jerusalem. It appears that they were not familiar with the politics and prophecies around the coming King. Herod, a politically savvy and ruthless ruler tried to manipulate the situation. He saw a threat, as his heritage was Edomite, not of the tribe of Judah. Herod's reign was punctuated with wiping out threats, even murdering family members.

When the Magi encountered Jesus, they had a life changing revelation. The King they sought to honour was in vastly different surroundings than they expected, yet in that meeting, spending time with Jesus, Mary and Joseph, something happened in their hearts. God communicated with them in a dream that they had to avoid Jerusalem. If we had read on, we would see that Joseph had a dream too and he took his little family escaping to Egypt to avoid Herod's evil plans. Mary and Joseph in their turn, had a new revelation about the

The whole story is a series of Epiphanies or revelations. God reveals his plans and purposes, his very Self in many and varied ways. What began for the Magi as an inkling, an educated guess, became something so important that they had to act on it. They were humble enough to accept that their ideas of where the King should be found might be wrong and were willing to seek in the unexpected places. These men were changed forever because of their seeking and finding the King of Kings.

We learn from the Epiphany story that when someone sets out to seek God, whatever their background may be, God reveals himself to them. What perhaps began as academic curiosity, became an urgent seeking then finding. The dream confirmed that their encounter with the Divine had moved from observational to deeply personal. And here we are today, celebrating Epiphany. How does God reveal himself to you? Is your heart open to fresh revelations? As we venture into a New Year, may we be receptive to what God is saying to us in 2026.
